Acceptance of a Grant Sub-Agreement between Cabrillo Community

College District and Chabot-Las Positas Community College District,

Las Positas College

Background: The 2014-15 budget signed by Governor Brown provided funding on a one-time basis to "create greater incentive for California Community Colleges to develop, enhance, retool, and expand quality career technical education offerings that build upon existing community college regional capacity to respond to regional labor market needs." Funds may be used for equipment, curriculum and professional development and "other related costs necessary to develop, enhance, retool, and expand quality career technical education offerings."

The legislation provided for the funds to be distributed through the regional consortia to their member colleges. The 28-college Bay region will receive a total of \$11,316,648. After a 5% set aside for administrative costs, 60% of the remaining funds will be distributed directly to colleges using a formula based on FTES. The remaining \$4.3M (approximately 40% of the total allocation) will be utilized to build the capacity of colleges to collaboratively meet regional workforce development needs. \$1.3M of this is being directly allocated in equal amounts to each of the colleges to support the work of aligning college CTE programs. \$3M will be allocated to multi-college partnerships that commit to collaborative efforts to address regional workforce development needs.

The legislation requires that funds target labor markets where the number of job openings exceeds the supply of candidates from community colleges and from other education and training providers. It also requires that funds be utilized to facilitate alignment of CTE programs across multiple colleges to better serve regional scale industries and labor markets.

Las Positas College has received \$163,028. The College will invest its share of the Enhancement Funds in the following program areas:

- Digital Media
- Welding/Engineering
- Computer Information Sciences

These are one-time funds that must be fully spent by March of 2016.

<u>Background</u>: This is a new MOU in partnership with the University of Phoenix (UOP) which will provide Las Positas College (LPC) students with financial and academic transfer benefits including a ten percent tuition reduction, guaranteed credit for identified LPC classes, and credit for completion of LPC general education patterns. In addition, the MOU creates clearly defined transfer pathways between LPC and the University of Phoenix. The MOU also provides for a ten percent tuition reduction for LPC employees who enter into a bachelor level program or higher. There are no costs to LPC or the District in implementing this MOU. The MOU will be reviewed on an annual basis at the end of each academic year.

Approval of Master Instructional Agreement - Eden Area Regional

Occupational Program (ROP) and Chabot-Las Positas Community College

District, Chabot College

<u>Background</u>: Traditionally, high school students have been connected to the college campus in several different ways: Articulation, Credit by Exam and Concurrent Enrollment. The following are the definitions:

Articulation: Students take a high school course that is deemed equivalent in rigor and content to an introductory level college course and for which they receive college credit once enrolled at Chabot College after graduation and completion of subsequent course within the career certificate or degree program sequence.

Credit by Exam: Students after successfully completing prerequisites enroll in the equivalent college-level course and take the final examination at the high school site. Grades are submitted to the college and students receive a separate transcript for their college coursework.

Concurrent Enrollment: High school students take college-level courses at the high school site either before or after the regular school day, at the college campus, or online. Students enroll directly through the college and receive a separate transcript for their college coursework. The high school district determines use of college units towards high school graduation credits.

The relationship between high schools and the community colleges is changing. Many districts, high schools and colleges, are moving towards dual enrollment.

Dual Enrollment: High school students receive both high school and college credit for the same class and generates revenue for both. A Dual Enrollment course is taught on the high school campus by qualified secondary education teachers or college instructors. The curriculum is the college course outline of record, but is delivered during the high school's academic calendar (semester or year-long course). Textbooks and materials used in class are those approved for use with the college curriculum.

Eden Area ROP and Chabot College have had articulation agreements in both Auto and Welding for many years. The instructors serve on each other's advisory boards and collaborate on instructional strategies, recommended materials and certifications. This partnership will be further enhanced by offering dual enrollment credit for participating students and be a pilot for other districts in the future.

Fiscal Impact: Since this is an existing class at Eden Area ROP, all start-up costs have already been incurred by their program. By providing dual enrollment, Chabot College will generate FTES for the students enrolled in the same formula currently in use. Chabot College will pay \$1500 to Eden Area ROP for a stipend for the instructor to take attendance, as well as any miscellaneous expenses. There will be no cost for the ROP instructor. A portion of the funding will be used to support Student Services, additional instructor time for collaboration and outreach for enrollment. Additional funding support will be through the Career Pathways Trust Grant for training. It is estimated that Dual Enrollment will be self-sustaining within two years.

<u>Recommended Action</u>: That the Board of Trustees approves the proposed Master Instructional Services Agreement with Eden Area Regional Occupational Program (ROP) for the 2015-16 academic year. It is further recommended that the Board authorize the Vice Chancellor, Business Services, to execute this agreement on behalf of the District.

Background: The District owns 400 acres of real property land in the City of Livermore for the purpose of preserving and restoring the grassland, blue oak woodlands and other natural ecological features found there. A portion of the property is being managed according to a Habitat Mitigation and Management Plan (HMMP) approved by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services. The proposals were evaluated for technical content using the evaluation procedures in the RFP. The three firms were then interviewed and ranked by a Las Positas College selection committee.

The District recommends the selection of Balfour Beatty Construction/HMC Architects as the Design/Builder for the New Academic Building 100 at Las Positas College. The building's base scope contains 14 multipurpose classrooms, 6 multipurpose computer classroom laboratories, and faculty and student support spaces. It is also recommended that the District accept the proposed alternate 120-seat large lecture hall.

<u>Background:</u> Solano County's Health and Social Services Department has contracted with Chabot-Las Positas Community College District's Economic Development Department to provide training to people who work with the out of home children and youth of Solano County since 2003-04. The County has requested that we continue to provide training services for the 2015-16 fiscal year.

As with the prior contracts, we will be working closely with our partners, A Better Way, Alternative Family Services, and Seneca Center, to deliver training to their own staff as well as to other Solano County community-based foster- and adoptive-care children caretakers. Additionally, the County's Child Welfare Services incorporates training for their staff as part of this contract. The contract is funded through Title IV-E federal funds, and the reimbursement is in the amount of \$752,055.

The contract states that Solano County will pay the District up to \$752,055 for training services provided. This contract has a term of twelve months (July 1, 2015 to June 30, 2016). The contract requires an in-kind match, which is the District's responsibility, which consists of the value of staffing, overhead, and facilities costs.

<u>Background:</u> Mendocino County's Health & Human Services Agency wishes to contract with Chabot-Las Positas Community College District's Economic Development Department to provide training to group home providers, foster family agencies and Health & Human Services Agency staff located in Mendocino County.

This will be our sixth fiscal year in contract with Mendocino County for Title IV-E funded trainings. This year we'll have three subcontractors: First 5 of Mendocino County, Mendocino County Youth Project, and Redwood Community Services, Inc.
