Counts Program, Contract No. CB2015-2016-07, Chabot College

<u>Background</u>: First 5 Alameda County, formerly known as the Alameda County Children and Families Commission, developed a strategic plan referred to as Every Child Counts that uses a cross-discipline approach in serving children age zero to five years old and their families. Through this program, a full-time College Professional Development Coordinator (PDC) works with faculty and student support programs, as well as collaborates with the broader Early Care and Education (ECE) and family support communities, to identify and promote resources for improving the professional development and service delivery systems in Alameda County.

First 5 would like to continue the relationship with the College by awarding a one-year contract renewal for the period July 1, 2015 – June 30, 2016, in the amount of \$183,100.

The Board of Trustees previously approved contracts for First 5 Alameda County on June 25, 2013, under item 5.8 for \$350,000; July 20, 2010, under item 5.6 for \$321.723; May 19, 2009 under item 5.3 for \$306,000; June 20, 2007 under item 4.3 for \$470,000; and June 21, 2005, under item 4.5 for \$230,000. Contracts were also approved under the former name, Alameda County Children and Families Commission.

Approval of Transfer Opportunity Program Agreement between the Chabot-

Las Positas Community College District and University of California Davis

<u>Background:</u> UC Davis Undergraduate Admissions is committed to providing Transfer Opportunity Program (TOP) services to Chabot and Las Positas Colleges. TOP provides support to enhance the colleges' transfer culture through advising, academic preparation, and sharing of best practices. TOP's objective is to increase the number of transfer ready students for four-year institutions and in particular to attend UC Davis.

TOP Agreements have been in existence for several years and the fee for services to the colleges varied. With this new agreement, the colleges will receive a number of services including advisors who will meet with students and discuss transfer to UC Davis, assist with the UC application and the UC Davis admission process, and with the financial aid process. Existing services including Transfer Admission Guarantee (TAG) assistance will continue. All participating community colleges will be assessed a \$7,000 participation fee. As this agreement is for both colleges, the total is \$14,000 for services provided during the 2015-2016 academic year.

Recommended Action: That the Board of Trustees approves the proposed Transfer Opportunity Program Agreement with the University of California Davis for the 2015-16 academic year in the amount of \$14,000. It is further recommended that the Board authorize the Vice Chancellor, Business Services, to execute the agreement on behalf of the District.

Approval of an Addendum to the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) -

Career Pathway Trust Partnership Agreement with the Peralta Community

College District

Background: This Addendum amends the original Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for the California Career Pathways Trust (CCPT) with the Peralta Community College District (PCCD). The Career Pathways Trust grant requires our regional consortium "to link employers and the educational institutions with a primary purpose of aggregating and making available work opportunities for students." To do this, the grant provided seed funds to community college partners to strengthen or establish a regional system for coordinating employer-education connections. On March 6, 2015, the consortium's Executive Committee decided to allocate \$1.5 million total in seed funding to community college partners to support this system.

Funds pay for a person to serve as the "workforce coordinator" who will serve as the point person on campus for coordinating employer engagement, represent the college on employer outreach, work-experiences for students, and connect with other regional workforce coordinators. Chabot College agrees to implement the strategies and solutions it has committed to as outlined in the agreement. These additional funds augment the existing award and are allocated in Years 2-3 in the following way:

First allocation 2015-16: \$86,368 Second allocation 2016-17: \$60,458

Third allocation 2016-17 (carryover permitted): \$25,911

Total: \$172,737

The effective date of this agreement is July 1, 2015 and remains effective until it terminates on June 30, 2017. Carryover of funds is allowed into the fourth project year.

<u>Recommended Action</u>: That the Board of Trustees approves the proposed Addendum to the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) Career Pathway Trust Partnership Agreement with the Peralta Community College District in the amount of \$172,737 for the period of July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2017. Approval of License Agreement - Alameda County Fire Department and Chabot

College

<u>Background</u>: Chabot College has an established agreement with the Alameda County Fire Department to use certain training facilities for instruction related to the College's Fire Technology program. The agreement authorizes use of certain facilities located at 890 Lola Street, San Leandro, CA 94577 including a training tower, classrooms, and practical instruction facilities.

This Agreement was initiated in February, 2015 with a beginning date of March 1, 2015 and concluding on February 28, 2017. However, due to uncertainty regarding the availability of the training facility and potential use by the City of San Leandro, the Agreement was withheld until confirmation regarding the availability of the property was received.

The Board of Trustees previously approved agreements between the Alameda County Fire Department and Chabot College on May 18, 2010, under item 5.6 for \$5,000 per year.

The charge for use of the facility is \$5,000 per year and pro-rated for each portion thereof.

<u>Recommended Action</u>: That the Board of Trustees approves the proposed License Agreement between the Alameda County Fire Department and Chabot College. Subject: Acceptance of a Grant Sub-Agreement between Cabrillo Community

College District and Chabot-Las Positas Community College District,

Chabot College

<u>Background</u>: The 2014-15 budget signed by Governor Brown provided funding on a one-time basis to "create greater incentive for California Community Colleges to develop, enhance, retool, and expand quality career technical education offerings that build upon existing community college regional capacity to respond to regional labor market needs." Funds may be used for equipment, curriculum and professional development and "other related costs necessary to develop, enhance, retool, and expand quality career technical education offerings."

The legislation provided for the funds to be distributed through the regional consortia to their member colleges. The 28-college Bay region will receive a total of \$11,316,648. After a 5% set aside for administrative costs, 60% of the remaining funds will be distributed directly to colleges using a formula based on FTES. The remaining \$4.3M (approximately 40% of the total allocation) will be utilized to build the capacity of colleges to collaboratively meet regional workforce development needs. \$1.3M of this is being directly allocated in equal amounts to each of the colleges to support the work of aligning college CTE programs. \$3M will be allocated to multi-college partnerships that commit to collaborative efforts to address regional workforce development needs.

The legislation requires that funds target labor markets where the number of job openings exceeds the supply of candidates from community colleges and from other education and training providers. It also requires that funds be utilized to facilitate alignment of CTE programs across multiple colleges to better serve regional scale industries and labor markets.

Chabot College has received \$238,688 as part of the 60% allocation, \$43,073 as part of the Building Capacity funding, and \$81,000 as part of the 40% multi-college grant. Chabot College will invest its share of the 60% CTE Enhancement Funds in the following program areas:

- Electronic Systems Technology
- ESL
- Digitial Media
- Automotive Technology
- Machine Tool Technology
- Welding Technology
- RN Program

These are one-time funds that must be fully spent by March of 2016.

Approval to Renew Agreement – State of California, Bureau of Automotive

Repair Smog Referee and Student Training Program with the Foundation for

California Community Colleges at Las Positas College

<u>Background</u>: Las Positas College has a successful auto technology program. The Foundation for California Community Colleges (FCCC) has operated the State of California's Bureau of Automotive Repair (BAR) Smog Referee and Lane Technician Training Program on the campus for more than eight years. The program provides referees to hear consumer complaints and to negotiate reasonable results in those disputes and to train student technicians to perform necessary technical services in the State's Smog Check program.

This agreement would continue the BAR's Smog Referee and Student Technician Training Program, combining public service to the community and a training program for students enrolled at the College. In addition, the FCCC will pay \$1,000 per month as a licensing fee for the use of the facilities at the College.

The term of the proposed renewal is July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2017.
