Background: The Las Positas College forensics team, LPC Talk Hawks, has been invited to participate in the International Forensics Association Tournament in Lima, Peru, March 10-20, 2017. The purpose of this trip is to expose students to the highest caliber of competition from both the United States as well as foreign institutions. The learning and cultural exposure that comes from participation at these international competitions outweighs the educational opportunities that are provided from similar tournaments held here in the Bay Area. Competitors continue to be awarded university scholarships as a direct result of their participation (and success) at this tournament.

The Las Positas College Talk Hawks have participated in this competition eight times in the past 11 years. In 2009 and 2016 LPC finished 2<sup>nd</sup> Place overall at the competition.

Board Policies 6216 (Field Trips) and 6217 (Travel Study Program), Administrative Rules and Procedures, and materials from our insurance broker have been reviewed. The District is in compliance with each of these and has secured all necessary and required waivers.

Subject: Approval of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) – Bay Area Shared Regional

ICT Lab (BACCC NETLAB) between Cabrillo College and Chabot College

<u>Background</u>: Cabrillo College has been awarded a CTE Enhancement grant to fund regional Information, Communication & Technology (ICT) lab. The 28 San Francisco Bay Area community colleges all have ICT related programs, and all struggle with funding, building and managing hands-on ICT lab facilities that provide skills demanded by ICT employers. The funding provided to Cabrillo College is one-time grant funding to develop staff and prove a regional shared ICT lab facility which will be used, initially, by 24 of the 28 colleges including Chabot College.

The combination of software and hardware will enable faculty and students, from any Internet accessible location, to utilize a virtual lab environment designed to provide employer demanded "hands-on" experience with a variety of computer operating systems, networking equipment, and application software. The solution comes with 450 proven ICT labs that will enable participating colleges to offer both entry-level classes and incumbent worker training in ICT related areas that range from introductory computer classes to cutting edge courses that focus on cybersecurity, virtualization, big data, operating system administration and network configuration and design. The remote lab system can accommodate 288 simultaneous connections and up to 16,128 individual 3-hour lab sessions during any 24/7 week.

A sustainability model will be developed in a transparent manner, with all participating colleges and the region's two Deputy Sector navigators (DSNs) during the grant funding period, with the idea that it can be supported through regional grant applications, colleges' cost savings from less frequent hardware replacement and system value.

This MOU shall become effective upon signature by the authorized officials from the signing partners and will remain in effect through June 2021.

Recommended Action: That the Board of Trustees approves the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for the Bay Area Shared Regional ICT Lab (BACCC NETLAB) with Cabrillo College from the date of signature through June 2021. It is further recommended that the Board authorize the Vice Chancellor, Business Services, to execute the MOU on behalf of the District.

Background: With funds from the National Science Foundation, De Anza Community College and San Francisco State University began the CCB FEST: Community College Biology Faculty Enhancement through Scientific Teaching effort. This program aims to expand the pool of eligible Biology Faculty within the California Community College system. Through the Classroom Partnership Program, current Community College instructors are paired with Biology Graduate Students where they participate in collaborative teaching activities, develop lesson plans, attend professional development workshops/meetings and monitor student learning.

An Adjunct Biology Instructor at Chabot College, was selected to participate out of a large pool of applicants. Upon approval of this MOU, the adjunct instructor and a graduate student partner will be engaging in the activities listed above. Additionally, at the end of the semester, the instructor and graduate student will be presenting a poster on their Science Education Partnership & Assessment Laboratory (SEPAL) experiences at the final Fall Luncheon Workshop on December 3, 2016.

Compensation: At the end of the Fall 2016 semester, the instructor will be compensated \$500 from SFSU. All payments are authorized by the SFSU Project Director upon the successful completion of responsibilities and the submission of all requested documents.

Background: Chabot College has received a program renewal for the Child Development Training Consortium (CDTC) 2016-2017 Instructional Agreement No. 16-17-4024 with the Yosemite Community College District (YCCD). The program allows the College to generate up to 700 units of college credit by enrolling students in courses required by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing to obtain a new or renew a currently held Child Development Permit. As these courses do not generate state apportionment, the agreement provides the College with \$25 per enrolled unit of coursework, not to exceed a total of \$17,500.

Approval of Title V Award - U.S. Department of Education, Reducing Time to Completion: A Holistic and Strategic Approach to and Addressing Student

Needs and Interests

Background: As a recipient of this award, Chabot College will implement a number of institution-wide activities that support Latino and other low-income student achievement throughout the life of their college careers. The objectives of the Title V award are comprised of four major components: 1) Establish a Latino-friendly, one-stop resource center for students and their families, El Centro, with a coordinated intake process that connects students to resources needed to accelerate and complete; 2) Strengthen key student transition points and barriers that impede timely completion with an additional focus on math; 3) Establish an Ethnic Studies pathway and connect it and other pathways to Learning Community and First-Year Experience (FYE) Programs; and 4) Provide professional development that supports culturally relevant teaching and learning. Grant funds in the amount of \$110,000 will also be used to establish a \$220,000 endowment fund that will be matched 1:1 by the Friends of Chabot Foundation.

Over the five-year grant period, Chabot College seeks to increase the enrollment of degree-seeking Hispanic and/or low-income students who are enrolled full-time, increase fall-to-fall persistence, improve outcomes for student in developmental math, and reduce time to completion.

Proposed funding for the five-year grant are as follows. The amounts are subject to annual renewal based upon performance.

Year One: \$525,000 Year Two: \$525,000 Year Three: \$484,011 Year Four: \$467,986 Year Five: \$374,136

Five-Year Total: \$2,376,133

<u>Background</u>: The Institutional Effectiveness Partnership Initiative (IEPI) is intended to assist colleges in strengthening their operations through the sharing of best practices by experts within the California Community College (CCC) system. Las Positas College (LPC) submitted a Letter of Interest to the IEPI and requested a visit by a Partnership Resource Team (PRT). The PRT came to LPC in October 2015 and February 2016 to address the two areas of focus the college identified: enrollment management and continuing/community education. The discussions held on both occasions were very helpful in identifying strategies the college could use to meet its challenges. Additional information about the colleges IEPI has been previously included in reports to the Board.

The IEPI program also offers seed funding to implement the strategies recommended by the PRT, in an amount up to \$200,000. LPC has completed its planning and is now requesting a \$200,000 seed grant to implement the recommendations of the IEPI PRT. This funding will allow LPC to improve its community and adult education programs, and enhance its enrollment.

<u>Recommended Action</u>: That the Board of Trustees accepts the Institutional Effectiveness Partnership Initiative Grant Agreement between Santa Clarita Community College District and Chabot-Las Positas Community College District. It is further recommended that the Board authorize the Vice Chancellor, Business Services, to execute the grant agreement on behalf of the District.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CHABOT LAS-POSITAS COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT APPROVING AMENDED AND RESTATED BYLAWS FOR THE CHABOT-LAS POSITAS COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT INDEPENDENT CITIZENS' BOND OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Chabot-Las Positas Community College District (the "District") previously adopted a resolution requesting Alameda and Contra Costa Counties, California (collectively, the "Counties") to call an election for general obligation bonds (the "2004 Election") held on March 2, 2004; and

WHEREAS, notice of the 2004 Election was duly given; and on March 2, 2004, the 2004 Election was duly held and conducted for the purpose of voting on a measure for the issuance of bonds of the District in the amount of \$498,000,000 ("Measure B"); and

WHEREAS, based on the Canvass and Statement of Results for the Counties, more than fifty-five percent of the votes cast on Measure B were in favor of issuing the aforementioned bonds; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the District previously adopted a resolution requesting the Counties to call an election for general obligation bonds (the "2016 Election," and together with the 2004 Election, the "Bond Elections") held on June 7, 2016; and

WHEREAS, notice of the 2016 Election was duly given; and on June 7, 2016, the 2016 Election was duly held and conducted for the purpose of voting a measure for the issuance of bonds of the District in the amount of \$950,000,000 ("Measure A"); and

WHEREAS, based on the Canvass and Statement of Results for the Counties, more than fifty-five percent of the votes cast on Measure A were in favor of issuing the aforementioned bonds; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the District (the "Board") previously has established an independent citizens' bond oversight committee (the "Committee") in connection with issuance of bonds under Measure B; and

WHEREAS, the Board has also previously approved Bylaws governing such Committee; and

WHEREAS, the Board now desires to further amend and restate such Bylaws, in whole, and establish a new Bond Oversight Committee for both Measure A and Measure B (so amended and restated, the "Amended and Restated Bylaws").

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CHABOT-LAS POSITAS COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT DOES HEREBY FIND, DETERMINE AND CERTIFY AS FOLLOWS:

**Section 1.** <u>Authorization.</u> Measure B and Measure A were authorized pursuant to paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of Section I of Article XIIIA of the California Constitution and subdivision (b) of Section 18 of Article XVI of the California Constitution in accordance with the requirements of the Strict Accountability In Local School Construction Bonds Act of 2000 (the "Act").

Section 2. Expansion of Role of Committee. The role of the existing Independent Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee (the "Committee") of the District is hereby expanded for the purposes set forth in the Act to oversee both Measure B and Measure A.

Section 3. Amended and Restated Bylaws. The Committee shall operate pursuant to the Board approved Amended and Restated Bylaws. The Committee shall have only those responsibilities granted to them in the Act, in the resolutions calling for the respective Bond Elections and in the Amended and Restated Bylaws. Acceptance of Grant Agreement - City of Dublin to the Tri-Valley One Stop

Career Center, District - Economic Development

<u>Background</u>: The Tri-Valley One Stop (TVOS) has been selected to serve as the Tri-Valley Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) site, to assist Dublin residents and other community members with tax return preparation and filing. The service encourages individuals to file timely tax returns and enables the submission of student FASFA applications. It helps taxpayers avoid predatory refund loans and expensive tax preparation, keeping money in their pockets. TVOS will recruit and train volunteers to serve as certified tax preparers, reviewers, instructors and site coordinators for the Tax Season 2017.

The City of Dublin has awarded a grant of \$6,000 to offset the cost of serving as the Tri-Valley VITA site. The grant period is July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2017. However, tax preparation services will be provided during the spring "tax season."

<u>Background</u>: Chabot-Las Positas Community College District was awarded a grant by the California Community College Chancellor's Office (CCCCO) to serve as the fiscal agent for the Strong Workforce Statewide Fiscal Omnibus grant. This statewide initiative was created to expand "the availability of quality community college career technical education and workforce development courses, programs, pathways, credentials, certificates and degrees." CLPCCD's Department of Economic Development will create and administer contracts to provide fiscal oversight, as well as serve as project manager, hiring vendors and creating subcontractors as required.

The award amount of the CCCCO Agreement No. 16-2005-001 is \$20,000,000, which includes funding for required staffing as well as administrative overhead costs. The contract is for the term of October 1, 2016 to December 31, 2017. As fiscal agent, CLPCCD will be required to establish subcontractors and work with the vendors necessary for the delivery of the products and/or services and act as fiscal agent as required to implement this contract.

<u>Recommended Action</u>: That the Board of Trustees accepts the proposed grant agreement No. 16-205-001 – California Community College Chancellor's Office, District-Economic Development, in the amount of \$20,000,000 for the period of October 1, 2016 to December 31, 2017. Center

<u>Background</u>: The Central California Builders Exchange (formerly the Fresno Builders Exchange) has nearly 800 members representing the entire spectrum of Central California's construction industry and has been serving Central California since 1903.
