<u>Background</u>: The purpose of this agreement is to contract with Revolution Foods to provide daily meals to the Chabot College ECD Laboratory School beginning January 27, 2018. The meals will comply with the nutrition standards established by the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP). This contract will replace the need to purchase and pay for food to be cooked onsite.

In this contract Chabot-Las Positas Community College District, Chabot College agrees to pay \$3.30 per lunch, per child, per day to Revolution Foods, not to exceed \$20,000. All meals include entrée and beverage that adheres to the menu patterns for the CACFP. Vended meals will be provided daily for the period of January 27, 2018 to June 30, 2018, with the exception of holidays and other school closures.

<u>Background</u>: With oversight from the Davenport Institute at the Pepperdine School of Public Policy, Chabot College, in collaboration with City of Hayward staff, will design and deliver community workshops to develop a community vision for the Tennyson Corridor for the City of Hayward, CA. The City of Hayward is funding coordination time for Sean McFarland, Language Arts Faculty, to supervise student workers and to provide overall coordination and leadership of Davenport Institute activities.

Chabot College students working with Chabot's Student Initiative Center will develop community engagement workshops to engage a broad cross section of Tennyson Corridor residents and stakeholders in the visioning process in order to identify community needs and desires for the Corridor. This input will support the development of the City of Hayward's Vision Plan for the Tennyson Corridor. Mr. McFarland will be responsible for the day-to-day supervision of student workers and ensuring that all Student Work Tasks and Deliverables are completed.

Funding will be in the amount of \$15,000 for the period of January 17, 2018 through June 30, 2018. Chabot will invoice the City of Hayward on a quarterly basis. Invoices shall include a brief description of services performed, date(s) of services, and the number of hours spent.

<u>Background</u>: The California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office has been undergoing an effort to integrate programs funded through its offices. Currently, there are three Chancellor's Office initiatives that are required to be integrated: Basic Skills Initiative (BSI), Student Equity Program (SE), and Student Success and Support Program (SSSP). These programs were selected as a starting point for integrative efforts for two main reasons: 1) all three have the same ultimate goal of increasing student success while closing achievement gaps; and 2) there is a strong potential for overlap between and among the programs.

The integrated BSI/SE/SSSP program model promotes integrated planning and program coordination at the district and college levels. In coming years, the Chancellor's Office intends to pursue changes in Education Code and Title 5 regulations to achieve even greater integration and alignment of the three programs in subsequent planning cycles.

The Plan was developed in consultation with students, staff, administrators, faculty, Academic Senate, and members of the community as appropriate. The plan is based on the Student Milestones Framework. The identified objectives are data driven and aligned with the 5 Framework Goals:

<u>Background</u>: The California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office has been undergoing an effort to integrate programs funded through its offices. Currently, there are three Chancellor's Office initiatives that are required to be integrated: Basic Skills Initiative (BSI), Student Equity Program (SE), and Student Success and Support Program (SSSP). These programs were selected as a starting point for integrative efforts for two main reasons: 1) all three have the same ultimate goal of increasing student success while closing achievement gaps; and 2) there is a strong potential for overlap between and among the programs.

In February 2017, the Chancellor's Office sent out memos to inform colleges of the new expenditure guidelines for all three programs as well as the new Integrated Plan documents. The planning documents are the first iteration of a larger integration effort on the part of the Chancellor's Office.

The Integrated Plan for BSI/SE/SSSP includes information on Las Positas College's progress to date for each of the programs, strategies that are resulting in success, the integrated goals for 2017-19, professional development plans, 2017-18 budget plans, integration strategies, evaluation plan, and an executive summary of the College's equity goals.

The total 2017-2018 allocations for the programs are as follows:

<u>Background</u>: The Las Positas College (LPC) Forensics Team, LPC Talk Hawks, has been invited to attend the International Forensics Association Tournament in Montreal, Canada, March 9-18, 2018.

The purpose of this trip is to expose LPC students to the highest caliber of competition from both the United States as well as foreign institutions. The students are, once again, ready for the challenge. It has been LPC Forensics' experience that the learning and cultural exposure that comes from participation at these international competitions far outweighs the educational opportunities that are provided from similar tournaments held here in the Bay Area. Typically, the best forensics programs in the country attend this event, so it is also an opportunity for Las Positas College to be exposed and showcased to the top speech and debate institutions around the world. LPC continues to have its student competitors awarded scholarships from 4-year institutions as a direct result of their success at this tournament.

Since 2006, the Talk Hawks have participated in this esteemed competition nine times, including trips to the Czech Republic, Argentina, Canada, Italy, Belgium, France, Spain, Austria, and Peru.

The Talk Hawks have won many international championship awards. In 2017, LPC had the International Champion in Persuasive Speaking and Communication Analysis and placed 2<sup>nd</sup> overall in the Community College Division. In 2006, 2009, and 2016, LPC had the International Champion in Informative Speaking. LPC students also earned International Championships in After Dinner Speaking, Prose Interpretation, and Duo Interpretation. In 2007 and 2016 LPC finished as the top two-year institution at the tournament. In 2009 and 2016, LPC finished 2<sup>nd</sup> Place overall at the competition.

Second Reading and Approval of College and Career Access Pathways

Partnership Agreement for Dual Enrollment between San Lorenzo Unified School District and Chabot Las-Positas Community College District, Chabot College

Background: The purpose of this College and Career Access Pathways (CCAP) Partnership Agreement is to provide high school students in San Lorenzo Unified School District an opportunity to earn early college credit at Chabot College while enrolled in high school. The intent is to offer and expand dual enrollment opportunities. These course offerings are consistent with the provisions of AB 288 (Education Code § 76004), for high school students who may not already be college bound or who are underrepresented in higher education.

The goals are to develop seamless pathways from high school to community college for career technical education or preparation for transfer, improve high school graduation rates, assist high school pupils to achieve college and career readiness and to serve "underachieving students", those from groups underrepresented in postsecondary education, those who are seeking advanced studies while in high school, and those seeking a career technical education credential or certificate.

These students who earn early college credit are more likely to earn high school diplomas, to enroll in community colleges and four-year colleges, to attend post-secondary education on a full-time basis, and to complete degrees in those institutions than students without these experiences.

The Board of Trustees approved the form and language of the Chabot-Las Positas Community College District College and Career Access Pathways Agreement at the July 9, 2016 meeting, Agenda Item 4.3. The San Lorenzo USD Agreement was placed on the agenda and considered as an informational item for First Reading at the December 5, 2017 Board meeting. The agreement is now presented for second reading and approval.

Approval for Establishing Non-Resident (Out-of-State and International) Tuition

Rates for 2018-19

<u>Background</u>: In accordance with Education Code Section 76140, the Board of Trustees must set the non-resident tuition rate for the succeeding fiscal year. In establishing this amount, the District may select from one of the following seven options:

- 1. Statewide average cost (\$258)
- 2. District average cost (\$288)
- 3. District average cost with 10% or more non-credit FTES (N/A)
- 4. Contiguous district (\$258)
- 5. No more than district average cost; no less than statewide average cost (\$258-\$288)
- 6. Statewide average fee (\$258)
- 7. No more than average tuition of 12 states with cost of living comparable to California (\$424)

The District served 447 full-time equivalent non-resident students in 2016-17 and 408 in 2015-16. The non-resident tuition rate of \$245 per semester unit was charged for the 2017-18 academic year. Administration recommends the rate of \$258 per semester unit for the 2018-19 academic year plus a \$17 per unit capital outlay fee for a total of \$275 per semester unit.

<u>Recommended Action</u>: That the Board of Trustees approve the proposed non-resident tuition rate of \$275 per semester unit for the 2018-19 academic year for non-resident students and international students.

Positas College

Background: In 2005, the Las Positas College Viticulture and Winery Technology (VWT) program was created to provide opportunity for students to pursue career technical and transfer education. In 2010, the Campus Hill Vineyard was installed to support the viticulture curriculum, and students' laboratory/hands-on learning in grape growing. The grapes grown in the Campus Hill Vineyard are then used to support the enology curriculum and students' laboratory/hands on learning in wine making and wine analysis. Over the past several years, the VWT program has acquired state-of-the-art instructional equipment to better support the enology and winemaking curriculum.

Producing the college's wine is a key component in the VWT program. Over the last 5 years the VWT Advisory Board has strongly recommended that we pursue a winery bond. Obtaining a winery bond will bring the program into state and federal compliance for the production and sale of our wine, and may be able to off-set program operating expenses. Obtaining a winery bond, will also give Las Positas College students experience in a "real winery," further elevating their employment potential.

To secure a winery bond, the college is seeking legal assistance from Mr. Brian Simas from the law firm Simas Taylor LLP. Mr. Simas specializes in winery bond legal services, and has assisted other California Community Colleges with meeting all the necessary state and federal requirements for licensing, including: (1) formation of a non-profit corporation, and (2) preparation and processing of applications with appropriate government agencies for the newly formed non-profit entity to operate a bonded winery on Las Positas College facilities. Fees payable to Simas Taylor LLP would include: (1) Deposit of \$4,246.00, and (2) by the hour fees for any additional time needed to fulfill College, District, and/or Attorney's preferences.

<u>Recommended Action</u>: That the Board of Trustees approves the agreement with Simas Taylor LLP for Winery Bond Legal Services, Las Positas College. The fee for this services would be a deposit of \$4,246.00, and (2) by the hour fees for any additional time needed to fulfill College, District, and/or Attorney's preferences. Approval of Grant Agreement No. C17-0064 - California Community

College Chancellor's Office (CCCCO), District-Economic Development

Background: Chabot-Las Positas Community College District (CLPCCD) was awarded a grant by the California Community College Chancellor's Office (CCCCO) to serve as fiscal agent for the California Community Colleges' Umoja Programs. The purpose of the grant is to provide funding necessary to provide technical assistance to the California Community Colleges' Umoja Programs, to foster the academic success of community college under-represented students. The Umoja Community serves at-risk, educationally and economically disadvantaged students, believing that when the voices and histories of students are deliberately and intentionally recognized, students develop self-efficacy and a foundation for academic success. Umoja actively promotes student success for all students, with an emphasis on African American student success, through culturally responsive curriculum and practices.

The grant is in the amount of \$2,500,000 for the period of January 1, 2018 through December 31, 2019.

Under the terms of this Grant Agreement, the role of fiscal agent requires that CLPCCD Economic Development create and implement contracts with vendors for data collection and reporting, curriculum and program creation and distribution, event planning and facilitation and technology purchases, and process invoices against those contracts, as directed by the CCCCO staff assigned to oversee this program. There is a standard contract format utilized with the vendors.

Recommended Action: That the Board of Trustees approves the proposed Grant Agreement for the California Community College Chancellor's Office (CCCCO), District-Economic Development, in the amount of \$2,500,000 for the period of January 1, 2018 through December 31, 2019.
