


Our Mission



STUDENT ENROLLMENT STATUS




STUDENT EDUCATION GOAL

Message from the Chancellor



The Chabot-Las Positas Community College District met the 2021-22 academic year with a renewed commitment to service, equity, and care for the communities we serve. The pandemic changed the higher education landscape. Our district pivoted quickly to meet the basic needs of students, deliver instruction in a variety of modalities, and strengthen the support programs that help students successfully reach their goals.

Our commitment is based on the knowledge of the real impact that a college degree can have on our students and their families. The average community college graduate with an associate degree will see an increase in earnings of just over \$11,000 annually when compared to someone with a high school diploma or equivalent. Those that go on to obtain their bachelor's degree will earn 84% more over a lifetime than someone with a high school diploma. Our colleges offer this upward mobility to students, many of whom are the first in their families to attend an institution of higher learning.

Chabot College and Las Positas College provide high-quality, affordable education and workforce training needed to drive our local economy. Our latest economic impact report puts our district's total impact on our community at nearly \$700 million.

Thank you for your continuous support of our district. I look forward to the opportunity to share how we can continue to partner in support of our students.



Chabot-Las Positas Community College District – Fiscal Outlook/Your Investment at Work

The District published an economic impact study in 2020 to determine the economic value and impact that the CLPCCD provides to its service area. This report assesses the impact of the District on the regional economy and the benefits generated by the District for students, taxpayers, and society. The results of this study show that CLPCCD creates a positive net impact on the regional economy and generates a positive return on investment for students, taxpayers, and society. Community colleges are local engines of opportunity. The following figures indicate the regional impact resulting from the District offering thousands of students a pathway to higher education and job skills.

OSHA Training Institute Education Center

The OSHA Training Institute Education Center (TIEC) provides occupational safety and health training to employers and workers through courses for construction, maritime, disaster site and general industries across the western region.

- 172 individual OSHA-authorized safety courses serving 2,554 students located throughout California, Nevada, and Hawaii.
- OSHA Outreach Program issued over 16,440 completion cards for employment in construction, general industry, and maritime occupations.
- Delivered 79 higher-level certificates in the field of occupational, environmental, health and safety.
- Over 400 virtual attendees at the Introduction to OSHA for Small Businesses class.

Apprenticeship Program

CLPCCD is expanding its apprenticeship program in construction and automotive trades. Apprentices receive college credit for their program's instruction, which offers them a pathway toward an associate degree in their field.

- New apprenticeships include dispensing opticians, precision manufacturing, informational security analyst, and truck driving.
- The district has the second largest program in the Bay Area, serving nearly 1,300 apprentices who took over 166,100 hours of instruction.

Child Welfare Training Program

The program provides training in areas such as trauma informed practices, culturally responsive services, and hundreds of additional topics across eight counties.

- Trained 53,287 participants.
- Partnered with 17 non-profit agencies and several national experts to provide over 31,845 hours of live and virtual training activities.
- Expanded services to Calaveras County.

Fiscal Agency


The Fiscal Agency team tracks and oversees how a client organization's project funds are spent. The CLPCCD served as the fiscal agent for six contracts totaling \$3,677,147 in revenue for a net profit of \$248,647.32 during the 2021-22 fiscal year.

Building For The Future

The final project in the Measure B Bond is the Chabot College Biology Building, which Chabot College occupied in February of 2022. This means that the voter-supported measure of \$460 million has been fully utilized, resulting in a total investment of \$606 million towards the colleges, including matching funds and other sources of funding, in addition to the voter-approved amount.

The district is making significant progress toward providing new facilities with the 2016 Measure A Bond program, which has a total value of \$950 million. Currently, over \$340 million from the voter-approved bond program is going toward the procurement, design and construction of new spaces. We invite the community to visit and see the improvements we're making to enhance our students' learning experiences.



Chabot Area Counseling Collaborative (CACC) – Fall 2022 High School Counselor Professional Day

Fifty local high school counselors, career center techs and college advisers attended this professional day. The theme was "high school counselors are superheroes!"

- Campus tours of STEM (Planetarium, new Life Sciences building) and Applied Tech (Welding, Machine Tool Technology).
- Presentations on learning communities, El Centro & Dream Center, Financial Aid, English, Math and ESL; Learning Skills Program, and Career Education.
- Launched our SOAR (Student Orientation and Registration) program to support high school seniors through the onboarding process.
- Distributed SOAR postcards to high school colleagues that provided links to the webpage.

CalFresh Success – Reducing the Financial Burden for Students

Chabot College is proud to be the first community college in Alameda County to operate the Fresh Success program. Through Fresh Success, CalFresh recipients enroll and take courses at Chabot College leading them to better employment and economic self-sufficiency while receiving supportive services. Fresh Success has nearly doubled the initial goal of serving 50 students.

Chabot College's First Outdoor Mural -"Tomorrow's World is Yours to Build"

Chabot College celebrated its first ever campus outdoor mural titled "Tomorrow's World is Yours to Build" on Tuesday, May 10, 2022. The project began as a request from the college's Stay Woke Collective student club, and was realized through the support and work of many student, faculty, classified professional, and administrative leaders of the college community.

The project began for artists, alumni Elizabeth Blancas and her team Jessica Sabogal, Shanna Strauss, and Malaya Tuyay, on September 15, 2021 to illustrate the wall featuring the key message that embodies the whole campus and its people.

- Track & Field: Chabot's 4x100-meter relay team of Marcell Anderson, Shamil Youngblood, Obinna Elendu and Zion Mayo finished fourth in the State Championships.



Friends Of Chabot College Foundation Highlights

Chabot's First Hispanic-Serving Institution (HSI) Endowment

The Friends of Chabot College (FCC) established its first-ever HSI endowment! In 2016, Chabot College was awarded a five-year, U.S. Department of Education, Title V, HSI grant providing the opportunity to fund student scholarships. Through fundraising efforts and a bequest from the late Ms. Berty Nebenzahl, the FCC was able to meet its five-year HSI endowment match commitment of \$220,000.


Over \$93,000 Scholarships Awarded In 2021

Las Positas College Highlights



President's Scholars Program

President Dyrell Foster created the LPC President's Scholars Program to attract the "best of the best" from among the diverse local area high school graduates. The program supports scholars throughout their two-year career at LPC by providing financial support, leadership development, service learning, and peer mentoring opportunities. The President's Scholars are viewed as the pinnacle of the larger Las Positas College community, representing a higher standard for comprehensive educational excellence. A President's Scholar serves as the model of an engaged and committed student. Twenty students were selected to this inaugural cohort.

Black Cultural Resource Center Grand Opening

The grand opening of the Black Cultural Resource Center (BCRC) was held in January of 2022. The BCRC is a place for LPC students to find resources for counseling services and educational resources. The Center will also offer resources to meet students' basic needs and provide an opportunity to access peer mentors. As a social hub, the BCRC will host Black History Month events, Black Scholars Family Night, and a Black Graduation Celebration.

The Art on Campus Taskforce Mural

Las Positas College's Art on Campus Taskforce commissioned a new mural on campus from Bay Area artist Aaron De La Cruz. In July 2021, he completed his mural entitled, "Fruits of Labor." The piece brings new life and energy to the campus and serves as a stunning welcome at the College's front door. De La Cruz's inspiration included LPC's Latinx population, the vineyard, and the campus surroundings.

> The design is influenced by the Mexican serape blanket and the line work is composed of a weaving technique that translates a similarity to the lines in which grape vines grow.

LPC Men's Basketball finished the season with a program-best 27-4 record, making their first-ever CCCAA State Championship appearance.



Additional Athletics Highlights

- Men's & Women's Soccer: Two All American honors and playoff experience.
- Men's and Women's Water Polo: Five all conference players and three athletes named to the all NorCal teams.
- Men's & Women's Swim & Dive: Five women and seven men went to the state championships. Ashley Sand broke two school records in breaststroke.

Las Positas College Foundation Highlights

Student Scholarships Awarded

The LPC Foundation awarded over \$330,000 in scholarships to more than 70 deserving students. Generous donors continued to invest in their success through a wide range of scholarships, including support for students transferring to four-year institutions, re-entering college after a lapse in attendance, training for a new career, veterans, and performing arts majors, among others.

New Major Gifts

The Las Positas College Foundation received major gifts expanding much needed resources for students. The Estate of Giovanna "Vanna" Born donated \$50,255 to the LPC Early Childhood Education Scholarship and Pat Wheeler's generous gift of \$20,000 established the Veterans First Responders Scholarship.

President's Speakers Series


