SUBJECT: COVID-19 Update

County Health Update: Alameda County has reported 79,598 confirmed cases of COVID-19 and 330,712 doses of vaccine administered (last updated February 24, 2021). Our county remains in the purple or 1st tier status.

In the State's Blueprint for a Safer Economy, every week the state assigns every county a tier based upon three factors. These factors include:

- Adjusted number of new COVID-19 cases reported per day, per 100,000 residents. Most recently, Alameda County has reported **9.5** adjusted cases per day, per 100,000 residents.
- Overall test positivity rate. This percentage represents the number of COVID-19 tests that resulted in a positive test result. Most recently, Alameda County has reported a test positivity rate of 3.2%.
- Lowest Healthy Places Index (HPI) test positivity rate. This percentage rate is a measure of different indicators that reflect geographic socioeconomic disadvantage. Most recently, Alameda County has reported a HPI test positivity rate of 5.3%.

Using these factors as a tool to assess readiness to move counties from more restrictive tiers to less, the state has developed the model below.

As can be seen, Alameda County is in tier 1 (purple) for adjusted cases per day, tier 2 (red) for HPI test positivity rate, and tier 3 (orange) for overall test positivity rate. For the state to move Alameda County

from tier 1 (purple) to tier 2 (red), all factors must be within the parameters of tier 2 (red) or better. <u>We are getting close!</u>

Throughout the District, planning discussions are underway to prepare for when we may begin to transition back to face-to-face instruction and services. We would like to acknowledge and thank our classified and faculty union representatives for being a part of these ongoing discussions.
